



Community. Voice. Perks. My Take on ODA Membership

FROM THE EDITOR

THIS IS A VERY SPECIAL ISSUE

of Membership Matters because it is being mailed to all dentists across Oregon so that we can highlight the Oregon Dental Conference and some of the other great work that the Oregon Dental Association is doing. For those of you who do not normally get Membership Matters, hello! Thank you for taking the time to riffle through these pages.

I am a 2017 graduate of Oregon Health & Science University, and I now practice general dentistry in a community health center in Medford, Oregon. My favorite procedures are extractions and class V composites. My perfect day off includes yoga, a hike, a good book, and dinner with my husband. I have served as the Editor for the ODA since 2018, a role in which I review each issue of Membership Matters and write a monthly editorial as well. (If this issue piques your interest, all issues of Membership Matters are available online at https://www.oregondental. org/member-center/publications/ membership-matters.) I also have a couple of national volunteer roles with the American Dental Association. And, of course, I am an ODA and ADA member.

For most folks, the next question is a simple one. "Why?" Why do I believe in organized dentistry, and why am I a member? These days, after eight years of membership, my answer breaks down into three parts: community, voice, and perks.

Community—The biggest asset of the ADA, ODA, and your local dental

society is its people. Just this week, a dentist in Kentucky reached out to me asking for a dentist for his patient moving to Missoula. (In my national role, Montana is one of the states that I represent.) With just a couple of texts, I had recommendations for him. Also this week, I got an email from a fellow ODA member. She had been on an ADA council with a dentist who practices in Missouri and teaches at A.T. Still's dental school. That Missouri dentist had met a dental student from Oregon who wants to move back and practice in public health. Within two emails, I was connected with the student. Wow! The ADA network is truly unbeatable, and I think our strength lies in our ability to connect dentists, dental students, pre-dental students, and patients to highly specific support and resources across the country.

Voice—Organized dentistry gives dentists the chance to share their voice and perspective from the most local settings to the national stage. We each have a unique experience of practicing dentistry, and when we can all share our perspectives, I believe that decisions will be more well-rounded and our profession will be stronger. Being involved with my local society (Southern Oregon Dental Society) and our ODA Board of Trustees has given me this opportunity to share my perspective and learn from other dentists. (Of course, as they say, if you're not at the table, you're on the menu. So you have to show up and participate for your voice to be heard.) Nationally,


the ADA is a steadfast advocate for dentists. ADA members and support staff consistently work with legislators and regulatory bodies to ensure that dentists' voices are heard and our practices and patients are protected. The same happens at the state level—check out our 2025 ODA legislative priorities on page 34. The more I have gotten involved with organized dentistry, the more I appreciate just how much the ADA and ODA do to protect us, and how critical our advocacy efforts are!

Perks—I firmly believe that the ODA and ADA dues pay for themselves in networking opportunities and advocacy. (Did you know that the ADA lobbied to remove a provision that would have required most of us to re-plumb our entire clinics last year, an expense of at least \$20,000?) I do love the member perks that we get on top of that, though. My personal favorites are the Hertz travel discount (consistently the cheapest way to rent a car) and the Laurel Road preferred mortgage rate (I bought a house last year, and their rates were by far the lowest, saving me hundreds of dollars per month). Being a member has also given me exclusive access to events such as a private night at Universal Studios and an interview panel with all of Oregon's candidates for governor.

That's my why. Let me know—what is yours? And for those of you that are curious, I would invite you to attend the ODC, become a member, and get involved. Try it out for a year, and see if you might find *your* why, too.

Herbal medicines now fall into the category of complementary and alternative medicines (CAMs). Herbal supplements are receiving increasing exposure through national media, in lay journals, and more recently in the scientific press. Although the growth of the herbal medicine industry in the U.S. is unlikely to continue indefinitely at its current pace, there is little indication of any major slowing. Many patients will continue to use herbal medications;

one survey found that an estimated 12.3 million adults (5.4% of the population) used alternative therapies as a substitute for costly prescription medications. With the popularity of CAMs, a new issue has arisen: herbal-drug interactions, of which oral healthcare professionals (OHCPs) must be aware. A survey of patients with heart disease, diabetes, psychiatric disorders, and/ or hypertension found that 79% were taking supplements concurrently with prescription medications. Among those with cardiac disease, 20% reported regular use of herbals. About 16% of patients with diabetes and 16% of patients with psychiatric disorders reported regular use of CAMs. These results underscore the prevalence of supplement use and the potential for herbal-drug interaction. The OHCP needs to be aware not only of these products' effects and advantageous synergies, but also of their side effects and potential adverse drug reactions. Critical patient populations are emphasized and specific herbal-drug interactions that can lead to increased bleeding, decreased blood glucose levels, and sedation changes are discussed.

This course is designed to mitigate any concerns dental staff may have when working in offices where nitrous oxide – oxygen inhalational sedation is provided. Perfect for every clinician, hygienist or team member who may be under the impression that the chronic environmental exposure to nitrous oxide could result in some type of fetotoxicity or teratogenicity in an expectant employee; this program debunks that myth. This comprehensive review of animal studies, early non-clinical trials which led to the development of safer masks and scavenging systems, and finally clinical trials which reinforce the wide margin of safety that this gas provides, this is a foundational course for all oral healthcare practitioners. As the late Dr. John Yageila said, "There has never been a death in a dental office, while dentistry is being done and nitrous oxide is the sole sedative being used." This level of safety is not only imparted to our patients, many of whom may be pregnant, but to our frontline

workers who may be considering starting a family but are concerned about working in an office where nitrous oxide – oxygen inhalational sedation is provided. Case studies will augment the delivery of key points and a problem-based learning approach is encouraged so that each participant's questions are addressed. After all, if the oath we all took upon graduation was to, "First, do no harm," then why would you not want to offer your patients and staff the best and safest treatment possible?

The field of sleep medicine has exploded and now includes myofunctional therapy as an adjunctive treatment. Studies show that airway surgery such as tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy alone are not enough to reverse the effects of obstructive sleep apnea. A meta-analysis of 331 studies, which was accepted for publication in Sleep, concluded that myofunctional therapy decreases AHI by ~50% in adults and 62% in children. Lower oxygen saturations, snoring, and sleepiness outcomes improve in adults. This is changing the way medical professionals treat OSA. Since publication of that study in 2023, orthodontists can guide craniofacial growth depending on age; therefore, it is important to work with other providers for a team-based approach to sleep-disordered breathing which functional repatterning is now considered essential! With research linking treatment protocols to success as an adjunctive treatment to oral facial pain, early interceptive orthodontic treatment, postorthodontic retention, periodontal therapy, and recognition and treatment of restricted frenum; health care workers may want to incorporate a systematic program into their practice. This course is an overview of the assessment, etiology, and treatment including some habit elimination therapy that a practitioner may implement into their practice.

This course will discuss the diagnosis, prevention, and management of common medical emergencies that might occur in dental offices. 

Advancements in medical/surgical treatment and pharmaceuticals have resulted in more patients with significant medical histories and extensive medication lists. These include diabetes, multiple drug interactions, cardiac abnormalities, liver disease, kidney disease, just to name a few. LEGISLATIVE PREVIEW

2025 Legislative Session to Focus on Housing, Transportation, Budgeting

ODA's legislative priorities include insurance reform, reimbursement, and a Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact focused on workforce

WITH MORE LEGISLATIVE CONCEPTS PROPOSED FOR THIS year than any prior legislative session, the 2025 Legislative Session promises to be a busy one for legislators and advocates alike. Governor Kotek and legislative leadership have made clear that they plan to tackle some of the biggest challenges facing Oregon during this legislative session, including housing and a large transportation package.

Legislators will also be tasked with developing and passing a budget for the coming biennium, a task made more difficult this year due to growing state budget constraints and increased budget requests from stakeholders across a variety of sectors.

With the focus of the session on big-ticket issues, industry-specific advocacy groups across the state have had to make difficult decisions about how to prioritize their legislative asks for the 2025 Legislative Session, including the Oregon Dental Association.

The ODA's Regulatory Affairs Committee (RAC) has been engaged in policy discussions with the ODA's government affairs team since early summer 2024 to determine what policies and legislative concepts the association would prioritize this year. As part of that process, the RAC took a hard look at what would be politically feasible given the external pressures facing legislators in 2025.

Ultimately, the RAC and the ODA Board of Trustees agreed upon a 2025 legislative agenda that prioritized what we heard from our members as some of their top priorities, including an insurance reform package of three bills that would help address current challenges facing patients and dental offices, and a bill seeking to include Oregon in the multi-state Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact, in order to support efforts to expand Oregon's dental workforce. Below are summaries of ODA's legislative priorities for 2025.

Assignment of Benefits

In Oregon, insurers are not required to submit insurance payments directly to the dentist when patients are seeing an out-of-network dentist. Instead, payments go directly to patients, a practice known as "assignment of benefits." This burdensome process often means that the patient is forced to pay out of pocket for services and await reimbursement from their insurer. while the dentist has to contact the patient for payment after services have been rendered, leading to confusion from patients who expect their insurers to pay providers directly.

This bill would allow patients to choose for payments to be sent directly to their provider, putting patients in control of their benefits while ensuring that the insurance benefit is used for its intended purpose.

Retroactive Denials

Retroactive denials allow insurance companies to require dentists to repay claims already paid to them when insurers discover they paid a claim mistakenly, even if the claim was processed years ago. This practice often results in unexpected bills for patients and erodes trust between patients and their dentists.

This bill would limit the time frame within which an insurer may demand

a refund on a claim they have paid. Most existing retroactive denial laws across the country limit the time frame allowed for insurer recoupment to 12-24 months, which is longer than the window of time many insurers give dentists to timely file claims.

Prompt Payment

Many dentists regularly encounter unpredictability and delay associated with getting paid by insurers. When these payments are delayed, dentists may have trouble paying staff and other administrative expenses, impacting the patient experience—and potentially access to dental care. This is particularly important today as operational costs have dramatically increased while insurer payments have not kept pace with inflation.

This bill would bring dental issuance laws in line with existing medical insurance laws, which require an insurer to pay a clean claim or deny the claim no later than 30 days after the date on which the insurer receives the claim. At the time of this writing, 46 other states had laws that required prompt payment from dental insurers.

Dental and Dental Hygienist Compact

The ODA team and leadership know that workforce challenges remain one of the biggest issues facing dentistry today. Given the political challenges around funding a broad, expensive dental workforce practice this year while the legislature is focused on big-ticket items like housing and transportation, the ODA opted to spend the duration of 2025 laying the groundwork for a future dental workforce package, including engaging in proactive, ongoing conversations with the Oregon Dental Hygienist Association (ODHA) and the Oregon Dental Assistants Association (ODAA). These partnerships will be critical in ensuring that the ODA,

the ODHA, and the ODAA enter a future legislative session with aligned goals and priorities, a key factor to successfully pass a future workforce package benefiting all dental practitioners.

In 2025, ODA's priority workforce legislation is focused on bringing Oregon into the Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact. The compact, which has already been approved by 10 states, will allow licensed dentists and dental hygienists to practice in all states participating in the compact, rather than get an individual license in every state in which they want to practice. The ability of dentists and hygienists to immediately treat patients after moving from another state to Oregon will increase Oregon's dental workforce. Mobility and multistate practice for licensed dentists and dental hygienists is particularly critical for dental practices or practitioners living in Portland and Vancouver, as they are not currently allowed to practice on both sides of the Oregon/Washington state border.

With the 2025 Legislative Session already underway, there has never been a more important time to get involved and advocate for policies benefitting patients and Oregon's dental practitioners. ODA's Legislative Action Team is one of the most straightforward ways to dip your feet into the world of advocacy. Your involvement with the Legislative Action Team can be big or small from writing a letter, to attending a meeting with a legislator, to testifying in a legislative committee, or attending a fundraiser on behalf of ODA's political action committee, DOPAC.

Recent ODA Advocacy Successes:

Dental Insurance Transparency: With the ODA-sponsored HB 3008, Oregon dentists became the *FIRST IN THE NATION* with the option to participate in-network leasing or accept reimbursements via third-party electronic credit cards, which often impose processing fees. The bill also provides access to more information up front, so dentists can avoid surprise expenses that harm patients and undermine their practice.

Access to Oral Health Care: ODA's advocacy ensured dental coverage was included in Oregon's new Bridge Plan and ODA earned HIGHER REIMBURSEMENT RATES for Dental Care Organizations and dental providers, as well as robust funding for health care provider incentive programs targeting underserved areas.

Workforce Development: ODA developed House Bill 2979 to expand the pipeline of dental assistants and hygienists, meet patient demand, and better support auxiliary staff, particularly those in *RURAL AND UNDERSERVED AREAS*, building a coalition of health care organizations and educational institutions advocating for this funding package

What else has our Advocacy Team been up to?

In recent months, we have:

- Helped lead the development of the OHA's Directed Payment proposals to CMS
- Actively engaged in discussions of Coordinated Care Organizations' dental rate setting
- Hosted the Governor Kotek Fundraiser at ODA headquarters
- Helped select Oregon's new Dental Director



- Provided one-on-one recommendations to the Oregon Health Authority about revisions to the Dental Service Rules
- Provided a voice for our members at Oregon Board of Dentistry meetings

Our Priorities for 2025:

Insurance Reform: We're working on policy solutions to help patients better understand their dental insurance and use their coverage more effectively (and reduce the administrative burden on providers). We are focusing on legislative efforts to cover:

- Retroactive Denials: Limiting the time frame within which an insurer may demand a refund on a claim they have already paid out
- Prompt Pay: Shortening the payment window from insurers to dental offices
- Assignment of Benefit: Allow patients to choose to have payment sent directly to their provider

Addressing Workforce Challenges:

The ODA is leading a Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact effort. Already approved by ten states, this compact will increase mobility for licensed dentists and dental hygienists and play an important role in addressing some of the workforce challenges our industry is facing.

Fair Reimbursement: ODA will continue urging the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to address Medicaid reimbursements so more dentists can serve our most vulnerable Oregonians. Since mid-2024, the ODA team has been engaged in conversations with the OHA to ensure that dental voices, perspectives, and challenges are heard when the OHA is making decisions about reimbursement rates.

Together, our voices can build better policies for our members and our patients.

CBCT Basics

CBCT IMAGING HAS BECOME AN ESSENTIAL PART of treatment planning throughout all fields of dentistry, but most dentists have not received specific training on this relatively new imaging modality. This article will provide some baseline information from which to build your knowledge.

CBCT stands for cone beam computed tomography and is a variation on the CAT scans of the past, now known as MDCT or simply CT (computed tomography) scans. In a CT scan, thin slice-like images are taken in three dimensions; then these slices are merged together to allow for a 3D view of the patient. This has a high radiation exposure

but provides very detailed information of primarily hard tissue, but also soft tissue findings within the full extent of the image volume. In a CBCT, a cone-shaped beam is utilized, rather than individual thin slices. This cone shape spins around a patient with the region of interest centered within the cone, also acquiring 3D image information but at a reduced patient radiation dose. Due to the cone geometry and reduced inherent contrast, the edges of the volume are often distorted and the soft tissue visualization is reduced compared to a standard CT scan. Because our work in dentistry is most often focused on hard tissue, the CBCT modality

has been widely adopted as it provides excellent hard tissue visualization within the focal area of the beam.

CBCT radiation dosing has steadily decreased since its introduction, and there are units available that boast that their patient exposure dose is similar to an FMX. This has increased the number of CBCTs taken as part of comprehensive examinations, for new patients and recall patients alike. Following the ALARA principles, CBCT use should be minimized unless specific treatment goals would benefit from 3D imaging. For those new patients with an interest in implant placement, concerning endodontically treated teeth, third molars that are present and may benefit from extraction, or an interest in orthodontic treatment where expansion may be indicated, a baseline CBCT with specific intraoral radiographs such as bitewings may be beneficial, rather than the prior commonly utilized FMX and Panoramic sequence. Basically, if you can see the need for a CBCT in the future, consider starting with one rather than a Panoramic/FMX and adding additional dosage with future CBCT. CBCT is not recommended for soft tissue evaluation such as intraoral soft tissue pathology or examination of the articular disk, but is often also beneficial for limited examination, especially in a smaller field of view.

When a CBCT is taken, the doctor is responsible for identifying the reason for scan or region of interest, examining the entire image, and documenting relevant findings. This can be done directly by the doctor who orders the image, or it can be completed by an oral and maxillofacial radiologist as part of a multidisciplinary approach. In a CBCT taken for implant planning purposes, the bone quality and quantity at the proposed implant site must be evaluated, as well as identification of nearby vital structures. However, all visible anatomy must also be evaluated, and significant findings should be documented. The smaller the field of view. the less anatomy there is to evaluate, but in comprehensive cases, or those regions of interest adjacent to vital structures, there is no avoiding evaluation of structures outside of the region of interest.

A methodical approach to CBCT evaluation is suggested, providing a blueprint to avoid missed anomalies and pathology. Thorough knowledge of normal anatomy is needed to identify the abnormal, and breaking evaluation into anatomic groups is a suggested method of evaluation. A recommendation is to utilize a stepwise approach and evaluate all anatomic groups present, then finish with the region of interest. Anatomic groupings can be determined by the practitioner, but it is common to break the image into sections including ENT/Airway, Maxilla/Mandible, Dentition, TMJ, Additional/Soft tissue findings. Running methodically through these systems prior to evaluation of the region of interest helps prevent missed findings and further familiarizes the practitioner with normal anatomy.

CBCT documentation should include a reason for scan or region of interest. Reason for scan is more generalized and often can be listed as "comprehensive examination" or "treatment planning," although additional information leading to the decision to take the image is beneficial. A region of interest is more specific, such as "implant planning," "evaluation of suspected pathology," or "third molar extraction planning." The region of interest must be documented in detail. The remainder of the documentation should include pertinent incidental findings. These findings can range from odontogenic findings including apical lesions and resorption, to systemic findings such as vascular calcifications and degenerative disk disease. Familiarizing yourself with the important incidental findings is part of the CBCT training process.

This baseline information can help doctors make sound decisions about when and how to take CBCT images, provide a methodical approach for image evaluation, and basic guidelines on minimum needed documentation. Education on normal anatomy, common incidental findings, and which incidental findings would be beneficial to document builds on this baseline.

Indigenous Oral Health: Every Dental Professional's Role

CAREQUEST INSTITUTE FOR ORAL **HEALTH'S 2023 WHITE PAPER states it** plainly: American Indian and Alaskan Native (Al/AN, native, indigenous) people face a severe and disproportionate burden of oral disease in our country.1 Al/AN children are three times more likely to have early childhood caries than non-Al/AN children.2 AI/AN adults are twice as likely to have untreated decay and ~20% more likely to report tooth loss than non-AI/AN adults.3 Native patients are less likely to have seen a dentist in the last year and more likely to visit the emergency department for tooth pain than non-native patients.1 The result of generations of oppression, abuse, and forced displacement, the indigenous population in our country faces poverty, malnutrition, homelessness, isolation (by physical or transportation barriers), and discrimination that limits access to meaningful and culturally competent oral health care. Decades spent without

culturally specific and effective solutions have led to significant distrust and anxiety around the dental profession in the indigenous community.

Just a problem for oral health professionals on the reservation? Absolutely not. According to the 2020 U.S. Census, among the 6.79 million native peoples living in our country, only 22% reside on reservations, and about 60% reside in metropolitan areas. Al/AN patients seek care in public health facilities, yes, but corporate offices, private practice, hospitals, and academic settings as well. Every dental professional has a role to play in improving the Al/AN community's experiences and oral health outcomes.

Where are we now? Federal programs are underfunded. Tribal clinics are understaffed and overwhelmed. Urban programs are limited in the care they can provide. Indigenous values are not recognized or understood widely in private and corporate

practice, often leading to distrust and poor patient outcomes. Academic institutions fail to admit AI/AN students, accurately represent and include the indigenous community in research, and teach professional students about caring for native patients. Studies have shown that increasing workforce diversity—native dentists seeing native patients—is one of the best ways to increase access and improve health equity and care quality.⁵ Yet, while 2% of the U.S. population is native, only 0.2% of dentists are.^{4,6}

As one of those 0.2% of dentists, currently practicing in a tribal community and with a history of practicing in a federal Indian Health Service (HIS) clinic and receiving care myself in both settings, I can attest that the barriers are present and discrimination is real. I can also attest that, although more difficult to identify and develop than the stark problems faced, meaningful solutions do exist.

So, where do we start?

In the public health setting, increased and reliable funding to provide more services and in more remote areas would improve access to care. Public health administrators and providers alike can seek out philanthropic institutions, grants, and public funds for support. Advocacy efforts, especially with specialty societies and organizations like the ODA and ADA, can be directed toward Medicare/Medicaid reform that benefits providers and patients. Those in the position to recruit providers to rural/tribal areas, especially those with indigenous identity, can be intentional in their offerings to ensure providers have the support-personally and professionally-to encourage retention and community integration. One way this is being done effectively now is through the Indian Health Service Health Professions Scholarship, which provides

year-for-year tuition coverage in health professional programs, like dental school, to native students in exchange for service commitment in native communities following graduation.

The private sector needs access to education regarding indigenous patients' needs, tribal resources, and proactive ways to overcome barriers to establishing dental homes. Cultural competency CE can be helpful. The Society of American Indian Dentists (SAID), IHS, and National Indian Health Board (NIHB) offer such courses and resources, including native providers to connect with and share personal concerns or recommendations. Understanding the identity of specific patients and their unique concerns and resources is important as well. Providers should feel empowered to ask their patients questions and develop individualized plans of action to improve oral health outcomes. If your patient is comfortable sharing their identity, do your research. Many tribes have websites that will detail their tribe's values and history for background (as well as their health care financing resources-many tribes will help cover members' health care costs!).

Academic institutions can partner with representative organizations like the SAID and NIHB to ensure research/studies are conducted inclusively. Schools can add focus to recruiting AI/AN applicants and utilize the knowledge of public health and indigenous faculty to develop culturally informed and native-developed coursework for oral health professional students. The Oregon Health and Science University School of Dentistry's new Wy'east Dentistry program, led by Dr. Chloe Craig (another Cherokee dentist!), is a great example of using native providers and educators to help increase native representation in the academic sphere to improve AI/AN oral health.

Oral health professionals involved in organized dentistry and advocacy efforts can be open to novel solutions to indigenous barriers to care—both physical and cultural. The discussion surrounding dental community health aides and dental therapists, among other access to care solutions proposed by the native community, is an important one that requires an open mind and compassion on all sides.

Reversing oral health inequities is the charge of everyone in the oral health profession. My hope is that oral health professionals are open to the idea of playing a role in addressing indigenous inequities. I recommend first starting with CareQuest Institute for Oral Health's 2023 White Paper. In this paper, you will see the hard work done already by many professionals to start addressing the native population's burdens and challenges. You will also find evidence of strategies starting to work. There is hope.
